Faith for Earth: A Call for Action

Several months ago a new book was published entitled Faith for Earth: A Call for Action. It was co-authored by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and the World Parliament of Religions. The message from the Faith for Earth Initiative in the opening pages notes that "We need a common ethical system of values no matter what religion we believe" (UNEP) and that "The context in which we will make our choices must include the full panoply of faith, science, and social institutions. If these institutions are to become agents of sustainability, they will need to be enabled by knowledge and inspired by faith." (Parliament of World's Religions).

The scriptural writings of each tradition as well as quotes from wisdom figures clearly articulate each faith's concern for the environment and a commitment to honor care for creation not only in words but by actions.



The section on Catholicism notes that Laudato Si' was written by Pope Francis to every person living on the planet and that it encompasses the fields of economics, politics, education, theology, and spirituality. It also states that "Since it was published, public perception of climate change as a moral issue has increased significantly and more people have been motivated to take action."

The message from the Faith for Earth Initiative reminds us that:

- "We are the first generation in human history that has the opportunity to achieve sustainable and just societies. We have the knowledge, the technology and the wealth to succeed."

Cincinnati Recycling and Reuse Hub

The Cincinnati Recycling & Reuse Hub is a nonprofit organization co-founded by 2019 Elizabeth Seton Award winner Colleen McSwiggin. It provides a "one-stop" drop-off location for items that can be recycled or reused, but that can't go into traditional recycling bins.

This new center whose mission is "to revolutionize how people think about "things" and to provide a place where almost anything can be recycled or reused", will open on April 1st and is located at 911 Evans Street 45204.

The center will accept the following items for free:

Art supplies: supplies for beading, jewelry making, candle making, drawing, knitting and crocheting, sewing and needling, painting

Glasses: Sunglasses, reading glasses, and prescription eyeglasses cont'd on p. 2



Recycling Hub cont'd

Shoes: any kind, in any condition

Health and Beauty Items: containers for lip, tooth, or skin care, razors, blister packs, and cough/cold/flu packaging

Medical equipment: walking aids, wheelchairs, braces, slings, empty pill bottles (label removed), and X-ray films

Metal: scrap, pipe, keys, hangers, tins, hardware, magnets, and more

Paper and cardboard

Party supplies: gift bags, tissue paper, balloons, and more

ALL #1-#7 plastics: clean lids and caps, straws, shrink wrap, fishing line, corrugated plastic, hangers, bubble wrap, utensils, gift cards, Tyvek envelopes, and all plastic packaging

Office and school supplies: paper, notebooks, folders, glue, stapler and staples, rulers, dried out markers, erasers, backpacks,

Styrofoam: egg cartons, packing peanuts, foam core, molded foam

Textiles: denim, sheets, towels, blankets, carpet, fabric scraps and swatches, and more.

Tools: scissors, X-acto knives, heat guns, glue guns, gardening tools, screwdrivers, hammers, wrenches, pliers, and more

Toys and Games: Marbles, board games, plastic toys, puzzle pieces, plush toys, yoga mats, and more

Wood: planks and sheets, scraps, dowel rods, popsicle sticks, distressed wood, spools, and more

institutions. If these institutions are to become agents of sustainability, they will need to be enabled by knowledge and inspired by faith."

The document also encourages faith communities to practice what they preach citing the following statistics:

"Faith-based organizations own 8% of the habitable land surface, 5% of all commercial forests, 50% of the schools in the world and 64% of schools in sub-Saharan Africa, 10% of the world's total financial institutions, and 14% of its community development corporations. There are 37 million churches in the world with 34,000 (Christian) denominations. The current number of mosques in the world is around 4 million. There are 20,000 synagogues and countless temples. Adapting these

establishments to produce their own energy, reduce their carbon foot - print, and extend these benefits to neighboring communities will be a massive demonstration of practicing what we preach."

- Buy organic foods that are free of toxic pesticides. Support farmers and companies who use organic ingredients.
- Give the gift of experiences with gift cards for restaurants, cinema, concerts, walking tours or adventure activities instead of physical products like plastic toys or gadgets.
- Shop at local farmers' markets when seasonally possible.



The Plastic Problem-by Father Emmett Farrell

Studies project that by 2050, there could be more plastic in our oceans than fish. Researchers estimate that on average, 8 million metric tons of plastic trash enter the ocean every year, an amount that keeps increasing. This pollution is ravaging our marine ecosystems, entangling and choking wildlife, such as seabirds, dolphins, fish and turtles, and even displacing plankton at the base of the food chain.

Scientists warn that pollution harms not only marine life, but also

human health, and that as climate change warms surface waters, health threats like algal blooms and outbreaks of water-borne diseases, such as cholera, are likely to become more frequent.

"Facing intensifying global efforts to curtail the use of oil and gas for transportation and energy — and at the same time seeking markets for the torrent of oil and gas from the U.S. fracking boom — the fossil fuel industry is looking to plastics as a lifeline," writes Antonia

Juhasz in Sierra Magazine.

"Today, 14 percent of oil and 8 percent of gas is used for the manufacture of petrochemicals, the essential feedstock of plastic production. The International Energy Agency predicts that by 2050, 50 percent of the growth in oil demand will be related to petrochemicals, overtaking the oil-demand growth related to automobile transportation," she adds.


